Establishing rule of law based on nondiscrimination policy: a major leadership function

As we grow up, we start assuming leadership in different capacities like: in the family, in the society we live in, at our workplaces, at the national or global stage and so on. This short write up will briefly expound as to why establishing rule of law based on nondiscrimination policy is a crucial leadership function? Policy of nondiscrimination is the cornerstone of a just society, a truly welfare-state and a peaceful world. More often than not, rules are not inadequate while the application is oft defied of universal principle of non-discrimination. Especially, in Bandladesh, "Rules are for fools", is a maxim of proper fit and relevance. Islam is a religion of peace and justice. It sprouted in a society that was ignorant and clan/tribe centric. Tribal elites could manipulate situations and judgment to their favor irrespective of their moral positions. But Islam under the leadership of Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) led the change in the society wherein, people would display their allegiance first to Allah SWT, then to His Prophet and then to the righteous leaders upon them. This guideline has been revealed through many verses in the Holy Quran. It was narrated from 'Aishah (R): "that Quraish became concerned about the case of the Makhzumi woman who had stolen, and they said: "Who will speak to the Messenger of Allah (44) concerning her?" They said: "Who would dare to do that other than Usamah bin Zaid, the beloved of the Messenger of Allah (ﷺ)?" So Usamah spoke to him, and the Messenger of Allah (4) said, "Are you interceding concerning one of the legal punishments of Allah (SWT)?" Then he stood up and addressed (the said: "O people! Those who came before you were people) n I y destroyed because when one of their nobles

stole, they let him off, but when one of the weak people among them stole, they would carry out the punishment on him. By Allah, if Fatimah, the daughter Muhammad were to steal, I would cut off her hand." Sunan Ibn Majah Volume 3, Book 29, Hadith 2547 (https://sunnah.com/ibnmajah:2547). The same Hadith with little variation is available in other Sahih Hadith Books too.

(tadabboor), we will find two elements were responsible to prejudice justice or cause discrimination: the powerful elites of the society and the person who interceded or recommended (lobbyist in present day context) for special favor to a person of his clan or tribe. It may be worth noting that the culture of manipulating justice or defiance of rule of law had been a cancer in that society. Islam thrived faster under Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) and his rightly guided Caliphs (Kholafa e Rashedin) pivoting around two important elements: faith (Iman) and good deeds (Amal e Saleha) (24:55). Leadership function of establishing rule of law is one of the crucial elements of good deeds. We need to remember that when one would be favored for anything it is likely to be the cause of prejudice to others (breach of Haqqul Ibad). We may find another perfect example from the Holy Quran in Chapter 18, Verse 86, 87 and 88 on the issue under scrutiny: Until, when he reached the setting place of the sun, he found it setting in a spring of black muddy (or hot) water. And he found near it a people. We (Allah) said (by inspiration): O Dhul-Qarnain! Either you punish them, or treat them with kindness (18:86). He said: As for him (a disbeliever in the Oneness of Allah) who does wrong, we shall punish him; and then he will be brought back unto his Lord; Who will punish him with a terrible torment (Hell) (18:87). But as for him who believes (in Allah's Oneness) and works righteousness, he shall have the best reward, (Paradise), and we (Dhul-Qarnain) shall speak unto him mild words (as instructions) (18:88). Here, there is none between the leader and the led in setting rules and implementing the same without discrimination. The Hadith and the three verses of Holy Quran reiterate the importance of non-interference by the stronger elites of the society in the implementation of the rule of law. It is equally important for the leaders to have required moral courage to speak truth to the power in implementing the policies and rules while implementing his leadership functions, be it at home, at workplace, in the society and the likes. May Allah grant us enough knowledge, fortitude and courage in upholding justice based on policy of non-discrimination. Ameen.
